Analysis of feedback of Teacher by Students

Introduction :

Students were asked to read and understand the meaning of each question in the questionnaire and then answer according to their observations.

• Objectives:

The objectives of feedback of teachers by students are to find out general attitude related to performance and relative status of a teacher on time management, subject command, confidence, language and communication skills, class control, general knowledge and awareness, use of teaching methods and aids internal evaluation, guidance.

Methodology:

A questionnaire, comprising questions related to ability / attitude and questions related to subject, was provided to the students to take feedback on all aspects to the teacher. A thirteen point scale – excellent, very good, good, satisfactory was used to evaluate the performance of a teacher.

• Findings :

The analysis of feedback reveals that majority of the student's registered very good, good, excellent, satisfactory remark. However, the specific suggestions are based on the overall performance of a particular teacher are

- 1) Teach slowly to make all the students understand.
- 2) Complete the syllabus with full focus on the content and co-related facets
- 3) Use simple language to communicate properly.
- 4) To use e-resources to make teaching advance.

• Action taken report

Analysis of feedback of Teacher by Students

• Introduction:




